merely intended to collect the names of owners
of lots and the number of lot where ascertained
from which minutes, a better map may be drawn
after more full information of the lots, avenues,
and alleys -

E T Foote for himself and A F Allen for himself and Horace F Foote have made the following agreement relative to removing the remains of Doctor Samuel Foote and his daughter Elizabeth from the old cemetery in Jerriestown to the Lot of E. T. Foote in the Lake View Cemetery of said Village - E T Foote removes the remains of said Samuel and Elizabeth onto his lot & puts the smallest stone at Elizabeths grave that has the date of her death, & gets her at her new grave and the other stone he lets the stone cutters have in trade for smaller stones one of which he puts at the grave of Dr Samuel Foote with his name & date of death. With this arrangement carried out E T Foote charges nothing for removal or reinterment or ground in his lot.

Said E. T. Foote grants to said A. F. Allen for himself or Horace Freeman Foote the right to insert on the west side of the base stone or shaft of his large family monument on his aforesaid lot such inscriptions as they may desire relative to Doctor Samuel Foote or his wife or daughter they paying the stone cutters for cutting the letters - For the share of monument so granted by E T Foote the said Allen agrees to pay said E T Foote or representatives forty dollars within two months - Witness our hands this 17th day of October 1859

Not- was written & I was about sending
it to the D. O. when your 13th ultimo
marked confidential, was received.
I then expected to reply immediately,
but my time has been so fully occupied
that I could not consistently attend
to it until now.

It was not intended to trespass on
your time, in pointing out persons of
whom Obituary notices might be written.
As you had written some notices of our
old inhabitants, I wrote, thinking it
would please you to furnish notices
of others, and send them to our
Village papers for publication. I
did not ^{expect} you would furnish notices of all
the persons mentioned. I thought that
among the persons mentioned you
might be pleased to select a few
whom you would be pleased to notice

I do not find it difficult to obtain
information of the dead of our village.
I have already collected a large mass
of information respecting them, which
I have laid up for future use.

I agree with you that fire proof
depositories for valuable books, papers
& records should be provided in all
places, at least of the size of Hamletton.
We much need a substantial tower
hall, with fire proof rooms, vaults &
safes in which valuable records of
all kinds can be deposited. As one
after another our Town, Village, Cemetery
Society, Corporate &c. volumes of records
are filled up, we need some safe place
of deposit, where neither dampness or
dust or fire shall destroy them. The
living acting mass care only for
the present. The past is neglected to
them. The Cemetery books of our day

may not be deemed of importance to
some go ahead & successor of mine
25 or 50 years hence. & therefore, in his
possession, may be led to use them
for kindling his fire or lighting his pipe.
We do need fire proof depositories for our
records - and in my opinion must have
one if we would preserve our local history.

I propose the inscriptions of Deacon Samuel Fouts and his wife, my beloved parents.

^{Deacon & Fouts} will commence high up and to be plainly read (after the monument is erected) the letters should be pretty large especially names -

Indeed, I desire all the lettering to be cut deep and so ^{large that} they can be easily read by one ^{standing} ^{on the grave} cut deep that they may be durable - cut plain that they may be easily read without spy glass or interpreter - I have seen some lettering on fire stones & by those that are called good workmen that need an interpreter and spy glass to read them - ^{Some parts of lettering too fine to be read at a little distance off necessarily} I suppose there is a plenty of ^{both of} coarse on the north side of the shaft for ~~both~~ the inscriptions of my parents and in large plain legible letters and without crowding the letters or lines

on the base I propose (north side) to insert the names of four brothers and sisters already deceased. The 5th Dr. Samuel Fouts name will be by itself on the West side of the shaft - ^{Five of my brothers and 4 of my sisters are deceased} Six of my father's children including myself are now living.

It may become desirable to insert on the north side of the base ^{the names of other brothers & sisters} ~~others~~ after their deceased and by having one name & particulars in one line in the way I propose five more I think might be added. The base is so long that the space for names &c may be long and still occupy only one line

By properly arranging the lines on the base the spaces for names & dates may be long and save much lettering as a will answer for so as well as to cut ^{the word} died - A & over again on every line or name inserted

Col A F Allen has the proposed inscription for Dr Saml Foots, wife and dowry. I did not keep a copy, but I think I may have named the north side of the base instead the north side shaft - I think you & Col A will think best to put Dr S F, wife on the shaft, & his dowry Eliz = abeth on the upper part of the base leaving room below her inscription for other relations hereafter, if desirable the same as I do on the north side of the base -

The west side of the monument I intend for myself and family - East side facing Henry Street Mrs Anna Foots inscription to occupy the lower part of the east side of the shaft

I suppose the names places of death &c of my brother & sisters on the base may be ^{so} spaced and arranged that the words "died in" "N.Y." "A" need not be repeated in each case no more than on the paper I have written

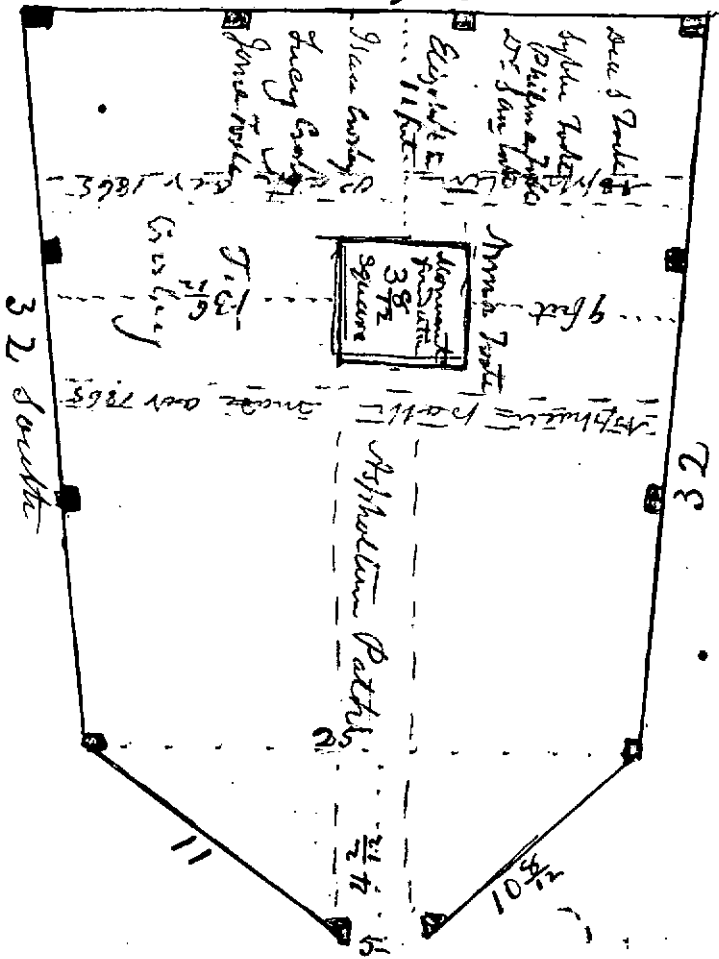

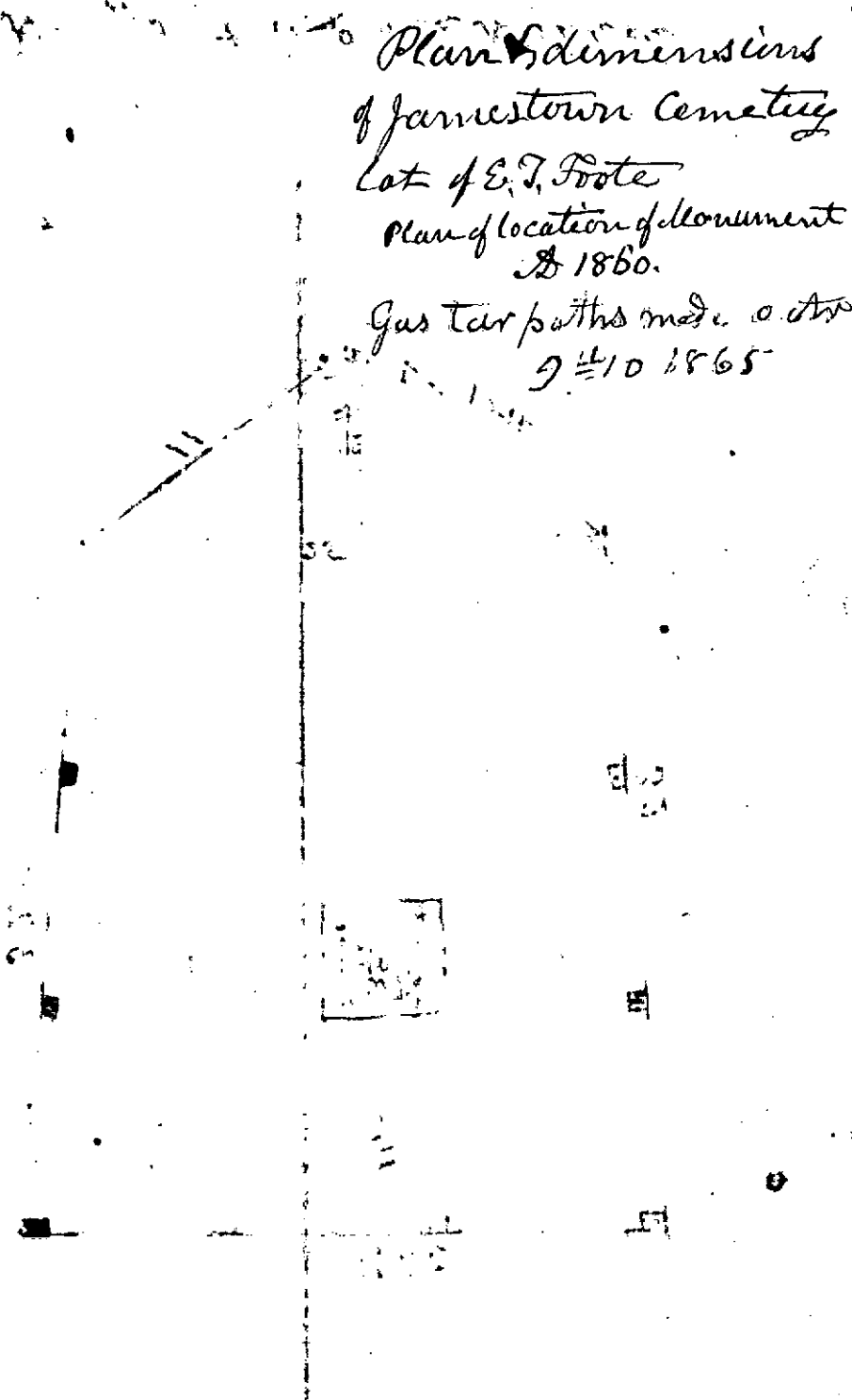

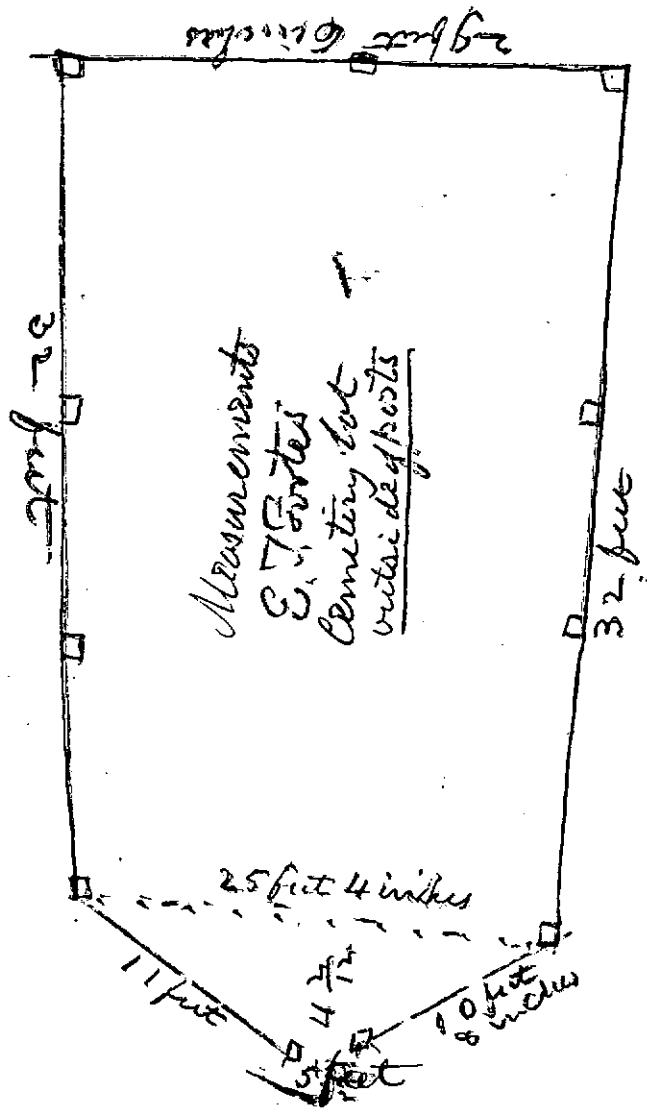
Plan & dimensions
